SPRING 2024 GRANT WRITING PLAN

In 2024, SUN is setting high goals for fundraising. Over the next five months, we hope to submit grant applications to nearly 20 local and national organizations. In total, we will apply for around \$99,000 to support SUN programming, general operations, and a new meal delivery vehicle.

In January, we already submitted and received two small grant requests. The first asked for funding to purchase traction devices for meal delivery volunteers. Our drivers could definitely use some extra gear as they navigate winter conditions. The second seeks to replace outdated first aid kits at our meal sites.

An exciting project we are currently working on is securing funds to create activity kits for use during congregate meals. The kits will give patrons an opportunity to play games such as Wheel of Fortune, The Price is Right, and Family Feud. An escape room activity is also in the works!

To wrap up the Spring, we will apply for three larger grants through Meals on Wheels of America and Otto Bremer Foundation. We will request around \$70,000 from these grants, so our spring success will be weighted heavily on these three. -Evelyn Kirner, SUN Spring Intern, UW Madison Student

ANNUAL CAMPAIGN BREAKS RECORDS

Prior to 2023, SUN's annual campaign would bring in \$10,000 or less. In 2022, the grand total was \$9,022. From October 2023 through early January 2024, \$30,097.69 were received, with another \$500 pledged. That is an incredible jump from one year to the next, representing a 337% improvement! How does that happen?

More letters were sent out and that letter was more urgently written, SUN was more visible in local press and on Facebook, and SUN did better at explaining where donations go and taking them in new ways. But truly, it comes down to more individuals and groups deciding to support this program!

86 total donations: 61 from Iowa County and 25 from Lafayette County.

The average lowa donation was \$304, with a high of \$5000 and a low of \$5. Half of lowa donations were at or below \$100. \$100 was most common.

The average Lafayette donation was \$245, with a high of \$1500 and a low of \$30. Half of Lafayette donations were below \$150.

\$18582.13 were contributed to Iowa County by Dec 31, with \$5382 coming after January 1, 2024. \$6133.56 came from Lafayette County, all by Dec 31.

Grace Lutheran Church held a very successful fundraiser among their congregation. Hidden Valley Church will be doing the same for SUN in February 2024.

COMING ATTRACTIONS FOR SUN'S UPCOMING "BLOCKBUSTERS"

We are launching a voucher program with restaurant partners. The first partner will hopefully be in place by April (with a formal announcement sooner). Seniors can request vouchers and then enjoy a "cashless" meal out. This will give seniors more options for where to get a hot nutritious meal.

In June, we will seek to partner with local businesses for coordinated community fundraising. There will be deals and "shop for a cause"

events that chip in for the SUN program. We will contact many businesses to try to find new friends.

For fall, we are exploring an event called "The Tour de SUN." This would include a 5K route and both longer and shorter routes highlighting local features. Registration fees for riders, walkers, and runners would support SUN. The theme would be "active aging" with supporting materials and vendors.



WHY DOES EVERY CONTRIBUTION MATTER?

Every meal contribution is so valuable to us! Those contributions not only keep the program going, they also keep you and your neighbors in your own homes. Not every senior can afford to pay for their meals, but these nutritious meals are vital to the senior community.

SUN is *not* a government program. We are a non-profit company that receives only partial government funding. The rest is in your hands. This is why every contribution is important to us and we appreciate every amount we receive, no matter how big or small. When you help support SUN, you help support your aging community. Our dollars stretch farther and we can serve more meals to more seniors!

2024 SUN WORD OF THE YEAR: ADAPT

We ask for trust and a little hope as we adapt and find the right path to meet today's community needs, funding, regulations and every challenge.

COME DINE WITH US! CONGREGATE MEALS

SUN receives government funding in two main categories: congregate meals and home delivered meals.

In 2024, SUN has much more funding available for congregate meals. Home delivered meals must be prioritized for those who truly need them, which is home-bound seniors who cannot otherwise feed themselves.

Congregate meals are a chance to meet with friends and socialize. If you still drive, then congregate meals are where we need you to come for your senior nutrition! This helps us provide Meals on Wheels to those who are most in need.

SUN has 8 dining sites in place, but

we are also working to add more restaurant options for those who might want to go out to eat with their family or a smaller group.

We are also looking to spice up our activity offerings. We will keep classics like BINGO and Birthday celebrations, but are exploring other new and exciting options.

SUN wants to create dining experiences that appeal to everyone. Our funding simply will not stretch to send meals home to everyone who requests them. We also cannot send out carryout meals— those count against our home delivered meals. Please come dine with us at a congregate site if able!



SENIORS UNITED FOR NUTRITION

Established as a 501c3 non profit organization on January 1, 1980 after 3 years as an lowa County department, SUN is still going strong. In 2023, 81 total volunteers and 31 different paid staff helped to serve 46,546 total senior meals to 667 seniors. 78,690 miles were claimed or logged by SUN volunteers and SUN vans in lowa and Lafayette Counties.

79.97 meals per Full Time Equivalent: it takes 1 hour to produce & serve 2 meals

\$120,000 payroll savings from volunteer hours (estimated from \$15/hr)

23,709 people live in 768 mi² in lowa County, 16,608 people live in 635 mi² in Lafayette County (our service areas are rural small towns)

70 meals served on average for each senior in the program

Full cost per meal including all salaries, supplies, rent and other overhead:

\$16.18 in Lafayette, \$14.30 in Iowa, \$13.34 is the Wisconsin overall average
